#### 2003 FOUNDERS TOUR

Suzanne & Jim Heatherington & Howard & Bettyann Finney enjoyed the 2003 AACA Founders Tour at Valley Forge, PA hosted by the Delaware Valley Region.

The early arrivals on Sunday were able to attend the Macungie car show of 1300 antique vehicles. Following the opening banquet on Sunday evening, we were entertained by the Philadelphia Mummers String Band. We started the tour on Monday morning with a special treat – a lovely catered breakfast at the home of Ray & Nancy Carr. Ray is in the Guinness Book of World Records for traveling across the United States from coast to coast in the oldest gasoline, steam and electric powered vehicles (1902 Northern, 1912 Baker and 1909 Stanley Steamer). In addition, Ray has also driven around the world in 80 days and from Peking to Paris in his 1939 Ford. Chatting with Ray was one of the highlights of the trip.

So as not to make this article too long I'll only list places of interest, etc. We visited the Landis Valley Museum, RR Museum of PA, Byers Choice Doll Museum, The American Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa (which was dedicated in 1966 to coincide with the celebration of Poland's millennium). An important part of Polish history is the portrait of Our Lady of Czestochowa which is one of the oldest of the Mother of Jesus in the world. It is also known as the Black Madonna.

We also visited the Mercer Museum which is an impressive concrete castle built by Henry Mercer to house his collection of early American tools, the Hagley Museum located along the Brandywine River which provided a glimpse of American life at home and at work in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Another highlight of the trip was The Magic Age of Steam which included seeing the world's largest collection of steam-powered automobiles and riding in a 1915 steam powered vehicle.

Other points of interest were the Brandywine River Museum which is internationally known for its collection of works by three generations of Wyeths and its fine collection of American illustration, still-life and landscape painting, The Franklin Mint which is famous for its finely detailed die-cast replicas of automobiles. We enjoyed wine tasting at the Chaddsford Winery, the Boyertown Museum of Historical Vehicles housing more than 50 rare automobile products under one roof, the Mid-Atlantic Air Museum of which the Black Widow P-61 Night Fighter is the rarest aircraft in this collection.

We also ate at some interesting places such as Stokesay Castle which is a replica of a 13<sup>th</sup> century Norman Castle, Kings Mills which dates back to the early 1700's and the Shady Maple Smorgasbord which featured authentic PA Dutch cooking.

We also enjoyed a bus and walking tour of Philadelphia. Part of this day was a 2 hour luncheon cruise aboard the "Spirit of Philadelphia". We viewed the Delaware River shoreline including Battleship New Jersey, Benjamin Franklin Bridge and the Philadelphia Navel Base.

Our fabulous week ended with a closing banquet in the Lancaster Ballroom-Convention Center.

On our trip home we stopped in Bedford and had lunch at the Jean Bonnet Tavern that was built in 1762 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. What a lovely way to conclude a great tour.

We made new friends, renewed some old friendships and had a wonderful time. There is so much to see and do in our state and we are so glad we experienced some of them.
