CARS I REMEMBER

The year is 1965. and I visited Page's in April. Page's Model "A" Garage was located in Haverhill, NH., which was a typical New England village. The garage was owned by N. F. Page, an executive of a large American Corporation.

His interest in Model "A's" began when he bought a new Ford roadster in 1928. The car started him on the road to love Model "A's". In 1940 he restored a 1932 Ford Station Wagon, to which he put a great deal of work. In 1949 he restored a 1930 Tudor Phaeton, and his sons also took an interest. Soon the hobby began to change into a business, and grew into the present garage, which employed four full time employees.

When I visited he had an inventory of over 50 "A's". Cars not suitable for restoring are stripped down for various parts. I visited some of the barns, garages and warehouses where he stored many of the cars and parts. He had 13 locations over a 10 mile radius. When I visited he had just bought a huge barn, capable of holding many cars.

He had in stock most of the 20 odd body styles that Ford manufactured. A restored 6 wheel roadster with rumble seat completely restored ran \$2,995.00. This was their top restoration.
