



Is Your Car Trailer Insured?

Many of our club members have car trailers, which are used to transport their antique cars to shows or tours. If you were to ask them if they have insurance on the trailer itself you will surely get a variety of answers. Not too many people are knowledgeable of their coverage. It turns out that most people make an assumption that it's covered as part of their tow vehicle automobile policy.

Well, they are partially correct. Most standard automobile policies do cover trailers in tow – But for LIABILTY only! That is to say if while rounding a corner your trailer knocked down a fence post and a mailbox, your insurance would pay for that liability. It would NOT pay any collision or comprehensive damage expenses incurred by that incident. (It goes without saying that your trailered antique vehicle would be covered by your separate antique car policy should it be damaged in an accident while being trailered.)

My advice is for every serious trailer owner to call or write his insurance agent and inquire about the coverage their regular automobile policy provides. It will most likely be exactly as I have stated above. The good news is that you can insure your trailer as an additional "vehicle" on your regular auto policy for less than \$50.00 depending on the value you declare. By doing this you are provided with collision and comprehensive coverage that will reimburse you for damage to the trailer and any additional installed equipment.

Tip: When discussing trailer replacement value with your insurance agent remember to include cost of winches, special tires and any custom installations you have made to the trailer.








On the 19th we passed on the dry run to Indiana County to attend a Memorial Mass for Dick Newell. Protect Your Car's Paint With Wax

A coat of wax is just a clear protectant for almost all painted, clear-coated, polished, chromed areas of your car except the rubber parts. It's better to have ultraviolet rays, ozone, acid rain, tree sap, road tar, and other road hazards attack a coat of wax than attack the car's paint.

Wax can be refreshed with little effort and cost, whereas replacing paint is financially painful. A good coat of wax also adds "depth of shine" and reflective gloss to the finish, but can't transform a neglected or abused finish.

Carnauba wax is the protective coating of the leaves of the tropical Carnauba plant. Pure Carnauba wax is the consistency of a brick. To be useful as a car wax, solvents, lubricants and numerous other additives are blended with the wax. Several coats of a quality Carnauba wax may be applied over a period of time without getting "wax buildup". Carnauba wax is sensitive to car washing so using a strong car wash solution or using dish detergent will strip the wax. Using a minimal amount of car wash soap in your wash solution helps your wax last a lot longer.

There are two forms of wax: paste and liquid. Their basic difference is the amount of solvents. Rock hard Carnauba is diluted with solvents to paste form or further diluted to liquid form. When you apply paste wax, the friction of application helps melt the wax and evaporate the solvents. A liquid wax usually contains more volatile solvents that evaporate out when the wax is applied. The excess wax, leftover lubricants, excess bonding agents, solvent residues, etc. form the "haze" that is buffed out to reveal the wax.

For wax to be effective, it must be applied *sparingly* to a <u>clean</u> surface. Apply the wax with a small piece of 100% cotton cloth or a terry cloth covered sponge or a foam type applicator pad. Make sure the paint surface is cool – you should be able to hold your hand comfortably on the paint. Work in the shade, preferably in a garage. In very high humidity, wax may not dry properly.

Rub wax thoroughly into the surface. This is NOT a situation where a little is good, so a lot must be better. Paint will only accept a certain amount of wax. If you apply 100 times more wax than needed, then you'll have to remove more wax in the form of dried powder. It makes waxing more difficult and requires more buffing.

Apply wax to the paint surface rubbing in a linear motion. Work into the paint in a front-to-back, back-to-front motion (the way the air flows over the car). Don't go around in circles the way dad taught you.

If you use a waxing pad and airborne grit gets under the pad, you have made sandpaper. If you work in a circle, you have made a 360-degree scratch (or swirl mark). Since a scratch or swirl mark is most visible from a 90 degree viewing angle, a circular scratch is visible anywhere. If you work in a linear motion and scratch the surface, the linear scratch is only visible from a small viewing angle.

Use only 100% cotton cloths on your car. Wash them in the washing machine using detergent only and no fabric softener in the water. Dry cloths in the dryer without using a dryer softener sheet which is chemically treated and will cause streaks.

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
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
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In 1967 FOSTER FIKE was elected President of the Region, which he had joined in 1958 and had been active in activities ever since. He operated his own heating service in Somerset, PA. He did most of his own restoring and probably best remembered for his 1924 Buick Touring. I remember when he and his wife Helen did a tour North to the New England states, a number of times to the Apple Blossom Festival at Winchester, VA. Foster also restored a 1904 Oldsmobile, a 1934 Midget Race Car and a 1946 Lincoln Continental Coupe. I also remember an early year Corvette. Several of his cars won AACA awards. His dedication to the Region has 1ed to the donation to the Region of the Foster Fike award to be presented annually to the best restoration shown at a Region function for the year. Often at a Meet, Foster would take me for a ride and I especially remember at Chapel Hill, N.C. when he had the 24 Buick Touring and asked me to go with him for a ride. Now Foster liked speed, and I think the Buick engine had been bored to the limit. We were riding on a straight road, and I recall the needle was well over 60 mph, and he said: "I hope we don't have to stop real fast". But that was Foster, and to know him was SPECIAL.















PUMPKIN SOUP Recipe from Donna Surace

This tasty soup is easy to make and delicious. The aroma alone is reason enough to make it!

3 c. mashed fresh pumpkin (or one 15-oz. can) 1/4 c. sugar

1 qt. heavy cream (or 2% milk for the health-conscious) 1½ tsp. cinnamon
