had sold the 1932 Chrysler in December, 1968, and again found myself without an antique car. I sold the Chrysler because was I was now involved in AACA judging, and realized that the car would never score with a non-original paint job. I wanted to own an AACA winner. So I started the hunt again.

In *Hemmings Motor News* I located a 1931 Chrysler Roadster which was located in PA, and had won a Senior Award. We looked at the car, which was very nice, and was in much better shape than the one in Ohio. But I could tell from Ann's look she wasn't thrilled. With no side window, her hair would blow, which she disliked in the Ford Roadster. It was a nice dry winter day and we headed home.

Late in January I read an ad in *Hemmings Motor News* for a 1931 Buick Series 50 Special Coupe, listed as a Model 56-s, and an AACA Junior at Hershey in 1968. I called and found the car to be located in Rochester, NY. I made arrangements with the owner to fly to NY and inspect the car. Cost of the round trip ticket was \$44.10 - leaving the Pittsburgh Airport at 1:50 p.m. arrive 3:21 p.m. NY time. Leave NY 9:05 p.m., arrive Pittsburgh 10:45 p.m. I recall I was home by midnight.

Without a doubt the car was a winner. Side mounts, rumble seat and white sidewall tires. I bought the car and made plans to bring it home in the spring. On a nice day in March, with my friend Merle, we drove to NY to load the car. The purchase price included a custom made cover which was rain proof with a very soft lining. I bought the car standing in a neighbor's heated garage, but he hadn't put the battery in, so I never heard it run. *Lesson #1*, some sellers don't always tell the truth. He asked to drive it onto the trailer for his last drive. We headed home on the Interstate.

At home when I went to unload it, I knew something was amiss. I registered it for the Spring Meet at Winchester. Ann & I left on Friday, stayed overnight at Hagerstown, and on to the Meet. Ready to unload it, I discovered the brake light on, battery DEAD. Dave Lizza and Paul Bell came to my rescue, got it started and onto the show field.

That night at the Award Banquet my name was never called. *Lesson # 2*, if you show a car, stay with it, don't

judge. During the next few weeks, I made some inquires and learned that a novice judge had taken off points for all the grease fittings. I sent literature, pictures and photos of the fittings to the AACA Chief Judge, who eventually admitted they were correct. Bring it to the next AACA Meet and he would see it was corrected.

During the summer I showed the Buick locally and it always won. At the Somerset Meet it backfired and almost caught on fire - no damage. This car had to go.

I advertised it in *Hemmings Motor News*, and received two inquiries - one from Hawaii, and the other from Philadelphia. The man had seen the car at Hershey, but it was sold when he called the owner. I told him the motor needed overhauled, no trouble for him, as that was his profession. He bought the car, and picked it up in October, 1969. At Hershey in 1970 it won the Senior Award. The car had never heard, *"When Better Cars Are Built, Buick Will Build Them."*

I was also getting tired of trailering cars, and we decided our next car would be a good driver. It was the end of the year, and I needed to find another car.

It was a bright, hot, sunny day. So a stroll through the air-conditioned AACA Museum itself was a refreshing pleasure.

The AACA Museum is a "world class" Museum. It is affiliated with the Smithstonian Museum network and is truly an outstanding place to visit. The interpretive educational set ups are superb. Fabulous color graphics, props, and recreated environments enhance a marvelous collection of historic passanger vehicles. You can walk from era to era - from an early twentieth century street to a 1950s Drive-In. Downstairs there is a wonderful collection of classic busses, motorcycles, a model train display and a replica of a classic diner.

In back of the Museum are buildings where it stores vehicles not currently on display. For a small donation visitors were able to walk through one of the buildings and enjoy viewing these vehicles. The vehicles were packed in neat and tight. Lighting was not the best. However, you were able to enjoy seeing everything from a stubby little AMC Pacer and brass era Hupmobile to an antique snow plow and King Midget maintenance vehicle.

Outside the Museum a 1920s Packard Roadster and Rolls Royce sedan kept circling the property on the driveway giving thrills to anyone who wanted to experience what it's like to ride in an antique car.

After the Museum and Car Show the Western PA Region tour bus stopped at Hershey's Chocolate World to gather sweet treats. The trip home included a dinner stop at Hoss's in Bedford. Mary the bus driver entertained the group with a few amusing stories, and ideas for possible future antique auto related bus tours. There was also plenty of time for car talk and fellowship.
