

paying for their own meals. There would be a stop on the way in for breakfast, and a stop on the way home for dinner. Exact departure, return times and details have yet to be determined. However, departure would be early in the



morning and return would be in the evening. The bus will be a comfortable, modern coach.

The Museum Car Show and Flea Market is from 8AM to 3PM. It is open to all pre-1985 vehicles including antiques, classics, street rods, trucks, buses, motorcycles and sports cars. My first two Model "A" Fords

Looking Back...

et's travel back to the 1960 era when I became interested in antique cars. At least then, you could tell a Chevrolet from a Cadillac, and a Model "A" Ford was the envy of my eyes.

I bought my first "A" in 1963 and a year later I had the desire to buy another one. In an August Sunday edition of the *Pittsburgh Press* was this ad. Antique 1930 Ford Sport coupe with side mount and rumble seat. Good condition. Asking \$500. Lafayette 7-1601. I called and they still had the car. They gave me the location. Today this would be the property just East of Delallo Market.

Ann and I drove down on Monday afternoon. They had the car outside the small barn. It was all original except the horn, never painted. The original paint was dull, and the interior was worn. The car ran OK. I bought it, and we went to Jeannette, exchanged the title, total \$9.00 and I started home with Ann following. Stopped in Saltsburg for gas, and on home. No problems.

Also advertised in the same paper, 1928 LaSalle Touring car, restored, immaculate condition, excellent mechanical condition, Hupstader Cadillac, Baum Blvd, 661-2304. Perhaps I should have looked at this one. Also in this section was the following: 1931 Ford Pickup, 95% restored, primed, \$550 Keysone 7-3846; Antique 1939 Packard 6 cyl small club coupe, nice condition \$465. One of the rare models. Call Leechburg VI 2-7572; Antique 1937 Chevrolet 2 door, A title, new battery, clutch, paint. Excellent condition, \$200. 327-6845.

The next ads were for hot rods. I kept the sport coupe for about a year, selling it to a young fellow, who later sold it to Jack Ross in Blairsville.

and Isaly's (you could almost smell their famous chipped chopped ham.)


