On the Road *With Your President*

s some of you know, I am "on the road" this winter, traveling to various AACA meets. On March 4 and 5, I attended the Southeastern Division Winter Meet, which was held at the Homestead-Miami Speedway, in Homestead, Florida. I arrived Friday afternoon, got settled in my hotel, picked up my registration packet and went to Judges School. As always, I found Judges School very informative. No matter how many times you attend an AACA Meet Judges School, you always take away something new. This time I learned about the changes to the Judges Manual for 2011.

The highlight of the weekend for me was the Friday evening bar-b-que and visit to the antique car "museum" and collection of Guy A. Lewis. Held at his home, we were served bar-b-qued chicken, baked beans and cole slaw, followed by cup cakes, which were out of this world. Instead of building a garage to hold his collection, Guy purchased a small house located in front of his residence, and turned the entire building into a shop and display area for his cars and automobilia. All of the interior walls of this one-story house had been removed, with exception of the wall between the back of the garage and one small room, which I believe was a workshop. Large sliding glass doors along the back of the house offered a full view of the contents of the building.

When I arrived at the property, there were cars parked on both sides of the road. Policemen were directing traffic and several young men were helping to park the cars. I was directed to a parking spot, then crossed the street and walked up the driveway, I passing a Dodge Touring Car, circa 1924. To

the left of the driveway was an early '50's' Buick and a couple of older Mercedes Benz's. Passing through a breezeway, I saw a number of Corvettes in the yard to my left. As I reached the back of the building, I saw at least 100 people gathered in groups, some standing and some seated around large, white patio tables. A long buffet table was set up along the back of the building, and through the open doors and large glass windows behind the table I could see several more cars and memorabilia located inside. I was directed to the buffet line, fixed a plate and found a place to sit. Across from me were two familiar faces: Doug and Ronnie Seabold, from Westlake, OH, who had attended our Founders Tour this past June.

Following dinner, I went into the garage to look around, and immediately noticed three more Corvettes, two brand spanking new Ford Shelby Mustangs, and a couple of cars I did not recognize. In addition to several gas pumps, many signs, oil cans and other collectibles, I noticed a number of model airplanes suspended from the ceiling which I later learned were all built by our host. I continued to wander around the property, and came upon several more Mercedes Benz's. When I went back to take a closer look at the Corvettes, I discovered two red Model A's, one a Roadster and the other a Phaeton, parked under a canopy.

As people started to leave, I sought out my host, introduced myself, and thanked him for allowing us to visit his collection. "Oh, no" he said. "Thank you for coming". I was told the following morning that Guy had registered 17 cars in the Meet, but only had 16 on the show field, as one would not start.

On Saturday morning, I attended the Judges Breakfast, and met my judging Team. I had three judges who were very experienced, and one judge that had only judged 6 times before. We had 7 Model A's, a 1935, a 1936, and a 1940 Ford to judge. Although there was a wide variety of cars and trucks at this Meet, I don't think it was as big as our car show.

It was close to 12:30 P.M. when I left Homestead and headed back to Cape Canaveral, FL, where Susan and I are staying. We are in the same complex as WPR Members, Charlie and Connie Schifano and Becky and Denny Blank. On Tuesday, March 8, Susan and I will be headed to Puerto Rico for their Special Meet. I will have a report for you when we return.

here were very few convertibles in Unity Township when this writer was growing up in the thirties. I remember on my daily walk to elementary school in Pleasant Unity, an outstanding one that remains in my mind. At the cross roads in that town on one corner was a large brick building and behind it, a brick

garage. The big building housed the Clover Farm grocery store, and in the garage, if the doors were open, sat a 1934 Plymouth convertible, shiny black. An important feature were the dual sidemounts and the natural wood wheels with rather large center hubs of chrome. Very few cars had sidemounts in those years. Those buildings are still there. In talking with Jack Clark one time about this car, he told me that he remembered this car in a garage near Hurst High School in Mount Pleasant Township. That garage is no longer standing, but Ron Barnhart remembers that it was owned by Bob Fenton.

In 1936 the girl on the neighboring farm bought a new

Chevrolet convertible coupe. It was green with yellow wheels. Sometimes when the weather was warm and I was walking home from school, she would pick me up and give me a ride. When the top was down I imagined that I was about as close to heaven as I would ever get. I talked with her many years ago and she told me that she had got her first job at the time. Her dad signed for the car then she paid him back.


The last convertible I remember before WWII was a 1942 Dodge convertible owned by Pete Harr, whose father owned the garage on the other side of the street from the store. It was grey, and would be very rare today. His father was a sub dealer for Plymouth and Dodge. In the early 1940s, the town also had a Chrysler dealer in the building across from the Gaut Funeral Home and the restaurant. I think that building is still there.

Growing up I believed that Pleasant Unity was the cross roads of the world, that would be until I went to high school in Latrobe.



Father of Traffic Safety

raffic circles, or roundabouts as they are often called, have been widely used in the northeastern states and have begun to be used more and more throughout the rest of the country. The idea of a one way roundabout, in addition to many other traffic ideas we take for granted today, were the work of William Eno, known as the "Father of Traffic Safety".

William Phelps Eno was born in New York in 1858. At the age of nine while on a trip to New York City with his mother, their carriage became involved in a traffic jam that took over an hour to resolve. This incident made an impact on Eno and he spent his life working to improve the traffic flow. Eno wrote a treatise titled "Reform of Our Street Traffic Urgently Needed" in 1900 and became known as a world-renowned expert on vehicular traffic. In 1903, he published the first primer for driving titled "The Rules for Driving" and developed the world's first traffic regulations in New York City. In 1904, Eno designed the country's first real roundabout that became known as New York City's Columbus Circle. Eno's reasoning behind the roundabout was that traffic would flow easier

if everyone were moving in the same direction. Eno frequently traveled abroad in his work and developed the first traffic plans for several foreign cities including London and Paris.

Other traffic ideas developed by Eno include the stop sign, one-way streets, pedestrian safety islands, crosswalks, bus stops, taxi stands and traffic signal towers. He is also credited for developing the ideas of "slow traffic keep right", "passing on the left only", pavement markings, the driver's license, vehicle registration, traffic cops, and issuing citations for traffic violations. In addition, he produced the concept of a subway in New York City.

Eno's developments extended to include maritime and railroad operations, and eventually, aviation. In 1921, Eno established the Eno Foundation, a private, non-profit organization dedicated to improving all modes of transportation on ground, air, and water. The Eno Foundation still exists today and publishes books and reports on various transportation topics, including the foundation's journal "Transportation Quarterly". William Eno was one of the founders of the Institute of Transportation Engineers in 1930.

John Eno died in 1945 at the age of 86. His inventions have undoubtedly prevented many accidents and saved many lives over the years. Ironically, the father of traffic safety cared very little for the automobile and he never learned to drive. He had a chauffeur drive him wherever he wanted to go.
