As our principal fundraiser, it is imperative that we sell all 5,000 Chance Car tickets. This past year we had approximately 199 unsold tickets, costing the Region \$995. Each year, Chance Car costs increase, but the number of tickets for sale remains the same. That results in less money for the Region.

Dues and attendance fees do not cover the costs for all of our activities. WPR's treasury, which is mainly funded by Chance Car ticket sales, subsidizes many functions in order

to keep costs affordable for members. To recognize ticket-sellers' efforts, they are frequently rewarded with discounts when participating in WPR activities.

In 2010, the Chance Car sat idle several weekends. All members are welcome and encouraged to take the Chance Car to an event or function. All you need to do is reserve a date. WPR reimburses the costs associated with taking the car, such as gas and admission fees. Examples of places to sell tickets include local car cruises, flea markets, family reunions, ice cream stands, K-Marts and Walmarts. If you had trouble selling tickets, volunteer to represent the Chance Car at an event where the car is shown such as the Irwin Car Cruise, Twin Lakes, or the Derry Ag Fair. The Region tries to find Chance Cars that look "so good" that the tickets sell themselves.

For 2011 we plan to put a color picture of the Chance Car on every ticket envelope, which should make ticket sales easier.

We would like every member to sell at least thirty tickets. In addition, we are asking every member to support our fundraising efforts by purchasing at least one Chance Car Ticket.

Thanks for the memories, and HAPPY 75th **ANNIVERSARY AACA!**



Looking Back... Looking For A Thunderbird

ven though I had joined the WPR in 1965, I really never got to know Jimmy Altman, one of the oldest members, until 1969. A group of us were traveling to our Annual Convention, and Jimmy was next to me in the back seat. We started

talking about cars, and I soon learned that he had owned the "A" coupe I had bought from Harvey Eger. I mentioned that I was looking for a truck to tow my trailer. It just happened that he was selling his truck, a 1965 Chevy 1/2 ton and I bought it. We became friends and Ann and I would visit Jim and Mary at their home above his shop.


At the WPR picnic near Ligonier, we were having a car game and Jim asked Ann to drive his 1956 T-Bird. She liked the car, but it was not for sale. He thought he know of one that might be. So the quest began. He wrote me concerning a 1955 Bird that a friend owned. The man was somewhat eccentric, and I have the letter the man wrote lim about the car. The price was \$4,000. and if Jim sold it he would get \$250. If they took less,

then Jim got less. Jim never mentioned this to me, and at the time a nice T-Bird was selling for \$2,500. I thought that the price was too high, and told him so. The car was originally purchased from the Ford garage in Indiana.

In May 1971 I received a letter from Jim telling me of the death of the man who had joined the Region. He lived in Lower Burrell and had a nice 1957 T-Bird. I waited a week and then called his wife. She was interested in selling, so I made an appointment to see the car. It was nice, and I made here an offer. She asked me to wait while she called Mr. Altman about the offer. Apparently Jim told her it was o.k., and I gave her a deposit, and the next day Ann and I picked up the car. We now had her a Thunderbird, which we kept for 18 years.

The other T-Bird was bought back by the Ford garage in Indiana and set in their showroom for a long time. It was bought by Bob Cable and he told me it was sold to a Florida couple.

I got the original sales sheet from the Ford Company for my 1957 Bird and the total price was \$3,377.33.



What Is That Class They Call HPOF?

H POF or Historic Preservation of Original Features is a very special EVALUATED, not judged, class for vehicles which are still unchanged from the way they were received from the factory by the dealer. These are exceedingly important to a restorer working on an incomplete or much modified vehicle, particularly on rare makes or models which are poorly documented in the literature. The small details are often what separate accurate restorations from the drivers. In the case of the author's 1914 Model T Ford, none of the many pictures available showed the correct wiring harness clip or routing for the sole electrical harness or the hose routing for the gas headlamps. Only when a famous HPOF Model T (Miss Vickery) was viewed at Hershey, were these details found. That HPOF badge means a lot!

But, you say, my car is all original. The previous owner told me so! The word "Original" means many things to different people. Does your car have all the original windows from the factory or have they been changed? Is the paint from the factory or have you repainted the car or parts of it? Is the upholstery from the factory, even if worn? The team is not evaluating condition of these items, just if they are unchanged from the day they left the factory. If unchanged, they are the valuable reference point. If redone, it's a beautiful restoration.

The HPOF Team consists of experienced AACA judges having 50 or more credits, who have taken the HPOF CJE (Continuing Judges Education) course and who agree to judge the HPOF class at each meet they attend. The team reports to the Chairman HPOF Committee (Luther Dundore from Pa.) and is approved by the VP Class Judging. Their job is to evaluate the vehicle which must be a minimum of 65% from the factory original to be certified and wear the HPOF badge. The forms used can be found in the official AACA Judging Manual. While the bulk of the cars entered in this class meet the "From the Factory" standard, there are problems certifying old restorations from the 1960's which now have faded and aged parts and may now look factory original at a first glance, new paint jobs on bodies and engines, radial tires where not originally equipped and partial restorations which destroy the value of the vehicle as a "restoration reference". While nice to look at, many of these vehicles belong in Class Judging or Driver Participation Classes.


