From Your President

hat a blessing it is to enjoy four distinct seasons here in Western PA.

What kind of winter old car memories do you have? Do you remember using tire chains for traction in the snow? Remember sawdust treads? Do you remember towns spreading ashes from the coal



mines and coke ovens rather than salt to help in the snow? Can you recall the groaning sound of a six volt system slowly turning the engine over in the cold?

Some of my favorite old car winter stories are about my Granddad Jackson. During the mid-to-late 1930's he worked at the Hannastown Mine operating the steam-powered hoist that carried men and coal in and out of the mine. He drove a 1928 Model A Ford from his home in Mount Pleasant to Hannastown every day. At the time this was considered a long commute. Antifreeze had not been invented yet, and alcohol was expensive. So to save his engine during winter months, he would drive the Model A to work early, park it, open the pitcock on the radiator and drain it. At the end of the day, he would take hot water from the steam engine which ran the mine hoist and fill his radiator up again for the ride home. This was quite the daily routine, but he was a very patient man.

One winter day, Granddad was driving his Model A home from Hannastown in a very heavy snow. He could barely see where he was going. Luckily, he could see the tail lights of another car ahead of him, so he figured the best thing to do was to follow those tail lights. The tail lights seemed to be heading towards Mount Pleasant. Things were going fairly well for a good distance. Then suddenly the car he was following stopped. Granddad stopped right in back of it. The man driving the car got out and walked back to Granddad's Model A. It was still snowing hard. He knocked on Granddad's window. Granddad rolled down his window and the man said. "I don't know about you, but I'm home." So focused was Granddad on the tail lights ahead of him, that he ended up following the man right into his driveway. Mildly embarrassed, he put the Model A in reverse, backed out of the driveway, and then made his way home on his own.

May your holiday travels be safe and may your New Year be warmed by fond memories and the laughter of family and friends.

The minutes of the November 18, 2014 regular monthly meeting will be printed in the January/February, 2015 Western Round-Up.

There were 52 members were in attendance and no guests. The meeting was called to order at 2:32 p.m. by President Craig DeFloria.

Minutes of the 2013 WPR Annual Meeting


