

Spring Tour - Bedford County Covered Bridges

wenty-two Western PA Region members and guests departed the Latrobe K-Mart parking lot at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 4th and headed east on the Lincoln Highway (U.S. Route 30) to Bedford County, PA. Their destination was Old Bedford Village just north of the town of Bedford, where they would gather to take a driving tour of the historic covered bridges of Bedford County.

The fresh, light green spring leaves on the trees and shrubs were just beginning to come out. At higher elevations there were no leaves yet, which allowed one to gaze into the surrounding "mountains" to see the edges of the ridge tops and make out interesting details on the forest floor.

The group arrived at the entrance to Old Bedford Village around 3:30 p.m. and crossed the Claycomb Covered Bridge into a parking area to regroup and begin driving the Bedford Covered Bridge Tour route as charted by the Bedford County Visitors Bureau. The route included nine historic covered bridges, of which the Claycomb bridge was the first. It was originally built in 1880 and moved from Reynoldsdale to Old Bedford Village in 1975. Everyone enjoyed stretching their legs at this site. Sprays of Virginia Bluebell wildflowers lined the banks of the stream below the bridge.

The tour route followed beautiful, winding and scenic country roads. The roads were mostly well maintained and it was a nice relaxing drive.

Since the leaves were just coming out, the structural details of these historic bridges were very visible. The group was fortunate to be able to drive through five of the nine bridges on the tour. The oldest was the Colvin Covered Bridge, which was built in 1866 and refurbished in 1997. The longest was the beautiful, red 1906 Herline Covered Bridge which crosses the Raystown Branch of the Juniata River.

All arrived at historic Jean Bonnet Tavern shortly before 5:00 p.m. and enjoyed a wonderful dinner together.

My dad worked for West Penn Power Co. At that time they were located on South Pennsylvania Avenue right in Greensburg. He started work at 7:00 a.m. So he left home about 6:30 a.m. and I was right with him. The old high school was up on the hill on Main Street in Greensburg. It took me about fifteen minutes to walk it.

My sophomore year the school started four vocational courses and being that I liked fooling around with cars, I took the vocational mechanics course. In the beginning, there was no way to get a car into the mechanics shop, so there were motors and transmissions on stands to take apart and put back together. The wood shop was assigned the job of making large doors to access Maple Avenue and also an access ramp to the floor of the shop

- about 3 1/2 ft. All of this was completed about the first three months of the school year. When it was finished we could bring a complete auto into the shop.


About the same time I was nearing sixteen-years-old and thought it was time to get a car. There was a little car lot in Greensburg called M & H Motors. It was located in the still vacant lot next to the then Altman's Feed Store, now an office supply shop on Maple Avenue. There was a 1933 Plymouth Coupe for sale and I bought it. The doors opened backwards. The first time I didn't get the door completely closed and tried to shut it while going down the road, the wind caught the door and about took the door and my arm with it.


I got way ahead of my story... After having access to the auto shop at high school I took my '33 Plymouth into the shop, painted it "jet" black with red wire spoked wheels. I dressed it up with wide white wall tires and a red velour interior. About that time I turned sixteen and failed my first driving test. The officer who gave me the test said that he very seldom passed a young kid the first time through. About a week later the same officer passed me and said, "Good job! Drive carefully," and I've tried to do so ever since.

Enough B.S. for now, I'll save some more for another day.

AACA Region/Chapter Development

here are areas of the country that are clearly under served by not having an AACA Region or Chapter. We all believe that for an AACA member to enjoy the full fellowship of the hobby, membership in a local Region/Chapter is necessary.

The AACA sponsors many National meets and a variety of tours throughout the year and participating in these events can be very enjoyable and rewarding. What can be more fun than a local tour with your classic vehicle and your local friends? Regions offer so many activities, such as flea markets, a weekend run to some historical attraction, a mini overnight tour, a monthly dinner meeting, a technical session, a local car display and the list goes on.

There are geographical areas where no AACA Regions or Chapters exist, and getting something started can be a simple process. To form a Region there needs to be a minimum of 15 AACA members and remember a member and spouse would be counted as 2 members. Eight AACA couples could start a Region. Five members are needed to start a Chapter and a 50 mile radius between Region locations should be maintained.

Trying to encourage new Region growth in no way should be perceived to pull members from an existing Region. A new Region in a remote area can serve as a convenience for our members so they may enjoy this wonderful hobby at its fullest. We have experienced that when a new Region is formed, membership growth occurs in AACA as well as the local Region.

There are currently 367 AACA Regions throughout the country and there is room for many more. When you look at areas where there are no Regions available, many times you will find some type of a local car club doing very well having shows, cruise-ins, and other events. They also are being supportive and making contributions to local charities, but they do not have any affiliation with a National organization. Recently, I found such a club that had been in existence for over 10 years that voted to become an AACA Region. There are some good

reasons for their decision. The club officers and members had concerns about liability exposure, so they began getting quotes for insurance coverage, which was around \$2,500.00 annually. Blanket coverage for this insurance is provided free by AACA and its Regions/Chapters policy. Additional benefits for AACA affiliation are a listing on the AACA web site, event promotion, and overall AACA support from its team of veterans in the hobby.

To organize a Region or Chapter, the process can be fairly simple. An application for the formation of a Region/Chapter may be obtained from the Vice President Regions Development and Support or AACA National Headquarters. The application package includes a Region or Chapter application form as appropriate, suggested uniform Bylaws, AACA Bylaws, Insurance Memorandum, Film and Video list along with a request form, AACA membership applications, membership brochures, and copies of recent issues of *Antique Automobile Magazine*.

The friendly, helpful AACA Headquarters staff is always willing to answer questions and provide an application package. The four AACA National Directors for Region Development and Support stand ready to help with this process as well.
