

t was a long summer of car shows but the Nash crazed duo had two more scheduled concourse meets to go. Since gas consumption was costing us hauling the trailer to and from home to these concourse meets, we decided to find a place to store the trailer with the Nash during the summer. Before returning back to Pennsylvania, we asked a fellow Nash member living in Northern Illinois if he wouldn't mind allowing us to leave the trailer. In late August, we drove to Illinois to pick up the trailer and drive it to the host hotel for the next concourse site in Geneva, Illinois (45 minutes from Chicago). The setting for this concourse was a quaint town with specialty shops and restaurants on the banks of the Fox River.

This concourse was a one-day event. The cars were parked onto the streets of town and a white chain was hung in front and at the back of the cars on display. The day started rainy, which didn't bother most drivers since the sun came out around lunchtime and allowed them to wipe down their cars as the public walked past with their umbrellas. clothing. We were not informed of a placement in our class, but three other Nashes also received an award. The award was a ten pound statue modeled after one of the car designers, Carl Benz, who was considered one of the founders of the early automobile (this was the information that we were given, not our opinion).

We drove the Nash back to the host hotel and drove the trailer back to our Nash member in Illinois to store it for a couple weeks when we would return for the last concourse meet in Iowa.

On September 7th, we drove our Suburban back to Illinois and had an overnight visit with our Nash members. The next morning, we drove the trailer and met up with another fellow Nash member along the route to Iowa.

Our last scheduled concourse meet was at Des Moines, Iowa.

On Saturday morning, we met at the state capitol building parking lot in Des Moines for a driving tour. We drove round trip up to 120 miles through the Iowa farmlands to the Iowa Speedway in Newtown, Iowa. We met in the media room where the press does their reporting while watching the race. We got into our cars and we were escorted by the track's pace car. We drove several laps on the speedway which was a 7/8 mile oval track, and it had 12 to 14 degree banking on the turns. We were told that this track is owned by NASCAR. After a quick stop at Victory Circle, we continue our drive

Tips for a Winning Show Car

I will never forget the first time I drove my show car on to the field at an AACA National Meet. The apprehension and nervousness was nearly unbearable. That was twenty years ago and I still have those same feelings every time I compete.

I learned a lot along the way to make show day more successful. You should start with the AACA Judging Guidelines. You can order one from headquarters for a small fee. You can save your money and receive a free one by attending a National Judging School or by downloading a copy from the AACA website.

Reading the judging guidelines prior to arriving at the meet can reap great rewards. This book gives you specifics about what judging deductions can be taken. After reviewing the guidelines, judge your own car to make sure you have the correct headlights, tires, spark plug wires and hose clamps, just to name a few of the potential problem areas.

Don't assume the show will be held on a cloudy or rainy day. Back your show car out of the garage in the bright sun. Open the hood, doors and trunk. If you notice something that makes you cringe, I guarantee, the judges will notice it also.

Invite a family member or a friend to inspect the car. The more "eyes" the better. Address any deficiency that is noticed.

If your car has unique or unusual features, make sure you bring along as much factory documentation as possible to share with the judges. I try to bring a dealer's sales brochure along with the Owner's Manual.

Finally, clean your car. The judges are judging your car as if it is sitting brand new at the dealer's showroom. Dirt in the wheel wells, grease on the engine, rust on the exhaust or dirty windows could be the difference between a great day and a big disappointment.

Glass Radiator Mascots Sparkle at Chrysler Art Museum

Jill and I enjoy going to Virginia Beach during the off season. We stay at a timeshare on the boardwalk savoring the ocean views and walks on the empty beach. While we need to wear jackets, it is very peaceful and relaxing.

This year we went the first week of December. Temperatures ranged from 49 to 67 degrees and the days were mostly pleasant. Many souvenir stores and restaurants along the main drag are closed, while some remain open. A few miles from the beach most everything is open.

Friday was a rainy day, so we set our sights on visiting an art museum we read about in the nearby city of Norfolk, Virginia. About a half hour drive from Virginia Beach, Norfolk is a beautiful place with much to offer. We easily found the Chrysler Art Museum and figured we'd spend a few hours looking around. Fact is, we could have spent the entire day there – what a delightful discovery this museum was.

We were astonished to find that admission was free to this beautiful building. All the staff members were also friendly and helpful at every turn. We learned that the museum was named for Walter P. Chrysler, Jr. He was the son of the Walter P. Chrysler who founded the Chrysler automobile corporation. Walter Jr. dedicated a great deal of his fortune to collecting art from all around the world. When deciding on a venue to share this fabulous collection with the public his wife suggested Norfolk, Virginia. The collection features art from many eras and cultures. Paintings range from Renior to Jackson Pollock. Artifacts range from Central American to Egyptian and on.

One of the museum's unique focuses is an outstanding collection of art glass and glassware. Currently, a special exhibition showcases the enchanting work of French glass artist, innovator and businessman René Lalique (1860-1945). Lalique developed his unique style and many imaginative creations during France's "Beautiful Era" prior to World War I. He also developed and patented numerous glass production processes which allowed him and his company

to create amazing designs in glass in large quantities from perfume bottles to vases and other functional glassware.

One section of the exhibition featured Lalique's creation of various glass mascots for early automobile radiator caps. These were used during the era when radiators were positioned up front and on the outside of cars for practical purposes. Since these radiators drew much attention, it was important to keep them attractive and stylish. When ordering a high-class European automobile during the early part of the 20th century one could choose from a variety of Lalique's glass radiator mascots if they wanted something distinctive.

René Lalique's factory is still in operation today and his beautiful historic radiator mascots, vases, perfume bottles, ash trays and other enchanting glass pieces have become valuable collectors items which reflect his creative genius.




Name That Car
