A Mothers Day Special One Mom's Story Leads to Charles Bra

was a lucky kid growing up near Greensburg, PA in the 60's and 70's. My parents were very understanding about my obsession with "old time cars", which started when they took me and my sister to a parade in the small town of Pleasant Unity when I was about three years old. Along with my growing interests and passions came many questions. They always answered them kindly with a touch of nostalgia, as they liked remembering "the good old days".


My dad got the lion's share of my old time car questions, but my mom got them too. She had her share of great stories. My mother was a teacher and could really connect with kids when she talked. Her maiden name was Jane Stoner. She was born in 1922 on a beautiful farm in Alverton, PA near Scottdale. I would often ask her, "Mom, what was the first car your family owned that you remember?" Her reply was always the same, "When I was a little girl my daddy had an old King Eight. It was a big car and had these small seats in the back which folded up for us kids." She would then go on to talk about an old Oakland, Model A Ford pickup and how my Grandpa Stoner eventually became a Buick man. I always loved the name "King Eight" and would try to imagine what that car looked like.

Today, the internet lays a universe of information at our fingertips. I enjoy looking things up on Wikipedia when I have a moment or two. It is here that I finally learned what I've always longed to learn about Grandpa Stoner's King Eight from long ago. I do not know what happened to that car, or any of the other cars mom talked about. But I do want to share what I found out about the King automobile, Mr. Charles Brady King and his significant contributions to our American automobile heritage.

Charles Brady King (February 2, 1868 – June 22, 1957) was an American engineer and entrepreneur remembered as an automotive pioneer, artist, etcher, musician, poet, architect, industrialist and inventor. He was born February 2, 1868, at Camp Reynolds on Angel Island, California. His father was a Civil War Union Army general, General John Haskell King. His mother was Matilda C. Davenport, from the New England family line of Davenports that settled in Detroit.

King was the first person in Detroit to design, build and drive a self-propelled automobile 3 months before Henry Ford built his automobile. The Detroit Journal of March 7, 1896, reports that King drove his motor-powered vehicle down Woodward Avenue – being the first person in Detroit to build and drive such a vehicle. The Journal also reports King made and sold the first complete automobile in Detroit

King started designing and building his first car from the time of the Chicago World's Fair of 1893. He test drove his first

car in Detroit in front of hundreds of spectators on March 6, 1896, at speeds up to seven miles per hour. It was powered by a Sintz engine. The time was just before 11 p.m. The route started from a building on St. Antoine Street, going south toward the Detroit River. When King arrived at Jefferson Avenue he turned right. After passing by several businesses he arrived at Woodward Avenue. He turned right again onto that street. He again passed by several businesses and then stopped for a short time at Cadillac Square at the Russell House hotel. Henry Ford was present when King demonstrated his horseless carriage, riding a bicycle behind!

When King showed his car to the Detroit public, it was probably was the first in Michigan, however not the first in the world nor even the first in the United States. King served as a mentor to Henry Ford, Ransom E. Olds and others for their inspiration to develop a "horseless carriage". Their gasoline powered automobiles came out months later. He did secret road tests in 1895, prior to this public display.

The Detroit Journal interviewed King and there he said what the journal considers his most famous quote: "I am convinced they [horseless carriages] will in time supersede the horse." The Detroit Free Press newspaper wrote up an article the next morning saying: "The first horseless carriage seen in this city was out on the streets last night. It is the invention of Charles B. King, a Detroiter, and its progress up down Woodward Avenue about 11 o'clock caused a deal of comment, people crowding around it so that its progress was impeded. The apparatus seemed to work all right, and went at the rate of five or six miles an hour at an even rate of speed."

King intended to run his "motocycle" in America's first automobile race on Thanksgiving Day in 1895. His car wasn't quite ready for the race, and like more than 70 other potential entrants to the event he was forced to drop out of the race. Instead, King served as an umpire during the race on the car driven by Oscar Mueller. When Mueller collapsed from

exposure near the end of the race, King took over as the driver. Other than the winning Duryea, this was the only other car to complete the entire course of the race.

King joined the Olds Motor Works around 1900, but resigned after their plant burned down. He then joined the Northern Manufacturing Company in 1902 and in 1903 became their chief engineer until 1908. One well known car he designed was the two-cylinder "Silent Northern" – the automobile with the first integrated motor and transmission assembly and the first side-step running boards. The 1907 Northern car model also had three-point engine suspension, air brakes, an air-controlled clutch and other innovations new to the auto industry of the time.

King went to Europe for two years to study automotive design in 1908. When he came back in 1910 he started the King Motor Car Company with the knowledge he acquired. He was the first automaker to make cars with left-hand steering. The new King car also incorporated advanced features, such as a Gray engine cast en bloc, cantilever springs, and a centrally-located gearshift. Possibly its most advanced feature was its lubrication system in which the flywheel served as a form of oil pump. He also was the first to successfully make a practical working V-8 engine. The King automobile called "the Eight" was advertised as "The Car of No Regrets." The King automobile was the only vehicle to feature left-hand steering at the 1912 New York Auto Show. Charles Brady King left the King Automobile company in 1912, however he held full possession of his patents. King is also considered the inventor of the jackhammer and patented many other tools and mechanisms which made him independently wealthy.

Starting in 1916, all King automobiles were 8-cylinder models. Production declined from a peak of 3000 in 1916 to a company low of 240 in 1923. During the healthier years, the company exported cars to Europe, Australia, South America, South Africa, and Russia. Early 4-cylinder cars sold for \$1,350 in basic form, and for \$1,565 when fully equipped with windshield, hood, and gas lamps. By 1914, even the V8-powered car was only \$1,350, and was advertised as the "World's First Popular-Priced V8". By 1923, prices were \$1795-\$2550.

In the fall of 1920, Artemus Ward and other company directors petitioned to have the company dissolved, citing not enough working capital and a failure to secure loans from banks. Early the next year, Charles A. Finnegan of Buffalo bought the company for \$500,000 and assumed company debts of approximately double that. The debt was paid off by late 1922 and the receivership was terminated. In October 1923, the firm moved to a much smaller Buffalo factory, but was bankrupt and finished by early 1924. While in bankruptcy hearings, remaining bodies and parts were shipped to England. There, 100 additional Kings were assembled in 1925.

Charles Brady King was a founding member of the Automobile Old Timers in 1939, the original name of what was to become the Automotive Hall of Fame.

From the Editor Why are there 1964 Pontiacs on the Cover?



I chose to exercise a bit of "editor's privilege" on the cover of this issue of *The Western Round-Up*. These two 1964 Pontiacs are from classic advertisements created by agencies and commercial artists from a long time ago. The images were created "old school" using film photography and watercolor paints – stuff I learned in college back in the 70's. These two Pontiacs are my silent tribute to one of the best friends I ever had, who lost a 13 year battle with multiple sclerosis and passed away on May 11, 2018. Emil Kuhar was like a brother to me. He was not a member of our club. You may or may not have known him, but his influence is reflected in the design and production of this publication and any photo that I have taken during my professional career.

Emil and I were roommates at LaRoche College for four years. He was an only child and lost his father and then his mother while he was at LaRoche. He carried on with a light heart and determination, ending up graduating with a degree in Graphic Design. At LaRoche we worked together on many "all nighter" projects and went on to grow professionally in our own businesses. Emil eventually became one of the best photographers and graphic designers in Westmoreland County. He would hire me for cartooning and layout. I would hire him for photography and design. We learned from each other and shared a strong work ethic.

Emil's greatest gift was his light heart. He was able to find the humor in everything and could lighten the mood of most any situation, even coping with multiple sclerosis. Emil married my sister's best friend Debbie. I served as his best man and he as mine.

While he was at LaRoche, Emil drove his father's 1964 Pontiac Catalina sedan. It was light green. We called it "The Boat". Emil loved that car and the nickname. He would sometimes drive it wearing a sea captain's hat and even had a fullsize wooden oar by the back window above the seat. All of us enjoyed going for a "Boat ride" with Emil. The Boat served as the wedding car for he and Debbie 37 years ago, and made for some great photos during that fun day. I remember buffing The Boat out only hours before their wedding so it would be nice and shiny.

Emil tried his best to keep the boat and restore it. He had the transmission rebuilt, the body redone and painted, but the problems began outweighing the investments, and with a beautiful baby girl, Elisa, to care for, The Boat finally had to go. In an early *Western Round-Up* I used a photo of The Boat from Emil and Debbie's wedding for a *Name That Car* article.

Emil was also a close friend of WPR member Joe Vrable. Joe busted his knuckles many times working on The Boat. Emil and Debbie are Godparents to Joe's daughter Amanda. Emil was the kind of friend everyone should have. You may not have known him, but now you do, if just a little bit.


