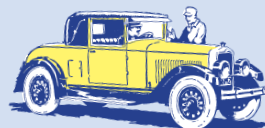

They're Only Original Once

I have heard some misconceptions lately about the HPOF class so let's take a closer look at the Historical Preservation Original Features Class or as a lot of people call it, The Original Class.

HPOF was created in 1988 to reward and provide incentives to keep vehicles in their original unaltered state and provide a living history of how factories manufactured these vehicles. They also serve as a record of how these vehicles should be restored.

There are two major areas evaluated in HPOF; maintenance and preservation. An HPOF vehicle is one that retains its original components and features not restored or altered. It must be an authentic vehicle as the dealer could have prepared for delivery to the customer with any feature, option, or accessory in factory literature or company directives for the model year of the vehicle. These are the same standards as class judging.

With HPOF, if a component serves the purpose for which it was intended, it's acceptable in most cases. For example, a bumper with some scratches and dings would be fine but one where all the chrome has flaked off and has holes rusted through would not be acceptable. There must be enough of the original vehicle left to be an example to a restorer.

Maintenance - Maintenance items are parts that will eventually have to be replaced if the vehicle is driven. Examples are batteries, belts, brakes, compressors, fuel pumps, hoses, alternators, tires, water pumps, and many other parts. Maintaining a vehicle is vital to its longevity so replacing maintenance items is not only accepted but it is encouraged and will not have a negative effect on the certification of the vehicle. Note that period correct replacements should be used and installed correctly.

Preservation - Many damaged exterior items can be replaced with NOS parts or better examples from salvage with no effect on the certification of the vehicle. Examples include bumpers, hoods, fenders, running boards, trunk lids, and most trim pieces. The same thing goes for many interior items as well. Searching the local salvage yards, swap meets, eBay, Hemmings, or other sources to find a correct replacement might take a while but part of the fun of the old car hobby is the hunt.

This is the first in a series about HPOF. Next time we'll look at some specific areas of vehicles. Remember, they're only original once.

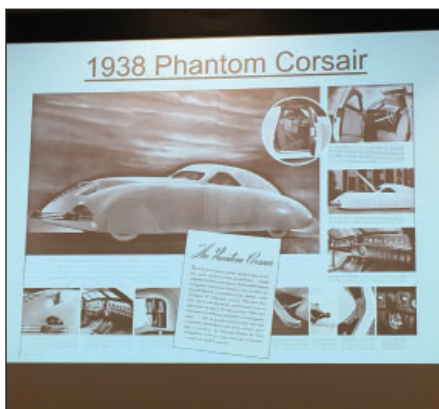
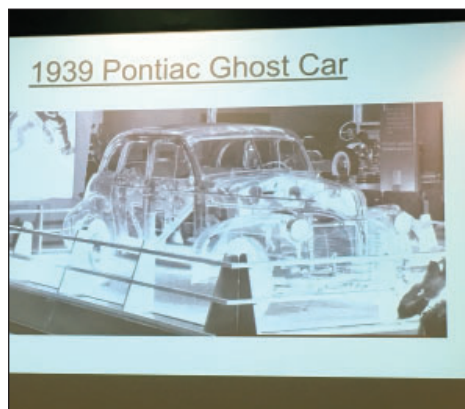

choose from running concurrently in well-organized time slots. The AACA staff and volunteers had meeting rooms and times well marked and were standing guard to guide anyone looking confused to where they wanted to go.

Jill and I enjoyed these great seminars:

Automobile Objects of Art was presented by Dave Bausch, who shared photos from his collection of creative, decorative and functional, auto-related items made during early 1900s. This was a time when the new-fangled automobile started to fire the imaginations of artists, craftspeople and novelty manufacturers all over the world.

The World of Wild, Wacky and Weird (But Wonderful) Cars was presented by the friendly staff of the AACA Library and Research Center – Cris Ritter, Mike Reilly and Matt Hocker. This was a light-hearted and informative look at some of the most unusual cars ever produced. It included the 1939 Pontiac “Ghost Car” with its transparent plexiglass body, which revealed the vehicle’s mechanisms for all to see.

Motor Girls or More Than Just Alice Ramsey was presented by former AACA first lady Sally Barnett. Sally introduced us to several innovative and courageous women who made their marks in the early days of automotive history. This included Berta Benz, wife of Karl Benz. Karl

invented what is considered the first practical automobile in 1885. Along with helping her husband build the car, Berta helped the public gain interest in this new invention by overriding her husband’s perfectionism. She did so by sneaking the car out of his workshop when she felt it was ready. Then she drove and maintained it 66 miles through the local countryside and villages, amazing all who saw it.

AACA Past President Terry Bond gave a fantastic, in-depth presentation – *More than Just a Lady Driving a Car: Joan Newton Cuneo*. Joan was one of America’s premier female tour, competitive and race car drivers.

Friday evening Jill and I attended the President’s Dinner on behalf of the Western PA Region. At this event we presented donations from our region to the AACA Library and the AACA Building Fund in the amount of \$500 each.

On Saturday we took the Philadelphia City Tour. This was our first time ever on this tour, which is offered every year by the Annual Meeting committee through the Big Bus Tour Company. We rode on a double decker bus with a see-through top. Yes, it was a little cold riding on top. However, touring in winter had its advantages since all the leaves were off of the many street trees which allowed us to take in the amazing details of this beautiful, historic city. The Big Bus tour guide was fantastic and put much passion, excitement and humor into his explanations. We

Tucker and listed these innovative features: a center headlight that turned with the front wheels, rear six cylinder helicopter engine converted to water cooling, and a safety front dash. Ed Vrable added these specifications: 126" wheelbase, 150 horsepower with a cruising speed of 100 mph and top speed of 130 with a fuel economy of 30-35 mpg. He and Nancy visited the Tucker Museum in Virginia and purchased a book on the car. Although only 51 Tuckers were produced, the Tucker inspired many safety innovations that have been further developed in today's modern cars.

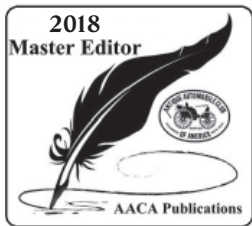
