

The Road Less Traveled By

With styling inspired by the dawn of the Space Age, this third generation Thunderbird features the original Sahara Rose color.

he 1962 Ford Thunderbird was available in four different models: the Hardtop; the Landau Coupe; the Convertible; and the Sports Roadster. All four versions were powered by the Thunderbird 390 cubic inch Special V8 engine which produced 300 horsepower. The Thunderbird Cruise-O-Matic transmission converted the energy from the engine to the rear wheels. Standard equipment included power steering, power brakes, and a swing-away steering wheel for easy entrance into the cabin. The luxurious interior featured crinkle-grain vinyls and Bedford cords, although glove-soft genuine leather was an option. The Thunderbird could be ordered in one of 18 color selections as well as 20 two tone color combinations for the hardtop. Other options for the 1962 model year included air conditioning, power windows, power seat, push button radio, and Kelsey-Hayes wire wheels.

Last year my brother Dave purchased a clean, low-mileage 1962 Thunderbird Hardtop from an elderly couple in nearby Youngstown. The couple had purchased the T-bird in 1984 and drove it to local cruises and car shows. They provided Dave with a detailed history of the car from new as well as original Ford sales literature. Always a local car, the couple enjoyed exploring the roads less traveled in the Thunderbird until 1995 when it was parked in their heated garage where it sat undisturbed for the next 26 years.

The Thunderbird's color is an attractive shade called Sahara rose which appears as a very soft pink. The car's handsome interior is colored black and white. Options include power windows, an AM radio, and the ultra impressive Kelsey-Hayes chrome wire wheels. The indoor long-term storage of the Thunderbird helped to keep the chrome and stainless trim in remarkably pristine condition, and the totally original interior is clean and attractive. The Thunderbird would be a fine candidate for AACA's HPOF (Historic Preservation of Original Features) class.

After Dave acquired the Thunderbird, he purchased a new original stock gas tank for it, replaced the brake and fuel lines, and carefully brought the engine back to life. The power windows function properly as well as all lights and gauges. The only item which may need further attention is the transmission which tends to shift erratically. Hopefully, the Thunderbird will be back on the road soon so that it can be enjoyed by both passengers and spectators alike.

This information was to be communicated only with the veteran's permission in time for our October monthly meeting. The list is featured on page 7 along with a group photo of those veterans who were able to attend the meeting. At the meeting Flo read a poem and prayer as a tribute. Then she called out the names on the list. Those present came up one by one and were given a "challenge coin" in honor of their service and then received a thank you hug from Flo. It was inspiring to watch members and friends we have known for so long be recognized and thanked for their contributions to the preservation of our freedom. Now in his 93rd year, and recovering well from recent hip surgery, long

time WPR member Bill Maurer was the oldest veteran in the group. After the program and meeting all present enjoyed a piece of patriotic red, white and blue decorated cake. There was also ice cream and a selection of fresh fruit.

Afterwards, John Kuhns, Sr. gave a presentation on the history of the Cities Service gas station his mother and family once ran, and his interesting collection of auto and soda fountain memorabilia.




nless you subscribe to USA TODAY or saw an article in one of our regional newspapers about this survey, you are probably not aware that USA TODAY has an annual top ten ranking of the best places to see fall foliage in the USA. Fortunately for us, Flo Myers picked the right weekend to arrange the WPR-AACA Fall Foliage Tour of our beautiful mountains. Despite the very windy conditions, it was an otherwise beautiful day with plenty of sunshine and white puffy clouds. Flo grew up in this area and knows all the country roads. In my many years of white-water kayaking and skiing I thought I had been on every country road on my way to and from 7 Springs, Hidden Valley, and Ohiopyle, but Flo mapped out a beautiful tour on many rural roads I had never traveled before.

Everyone arrived early at our starting point in Mountain Laurel Plaza on Route 30 in Latrobe, so we had some time to socialize before the start of the tour. Flo brought the magnetic signs, made by Cris & Molly Detweiler, to put on our cars to help promote our club in hopes of recruiting new members. Unfortunately, it was so windy that we were very concerned about those signs blowing off, so a decision was made to put just one sign on Mark and Jill Jackson's 1999 Buick Regal to

test the magnetic strength. We were pleasantly surprised that despite a slightly curled-up edge on the entire length of the sign, it was still there when we arrived at our mid-afternoon dinner break at the Creekside Grill.

We were not too concerned about losing anyone on the tour, which started about one o'clock, when Flo and John Myers led us out of the parking lot in John's 1950 Plymouth with a

103 HP Mopar six cylinder. All six of the following collector cars and one daily driver were newer and more powerful than John's Plymouth. Even so, he did need to slow down and/or pull over a couple of times so the tail end of our caravan of 8 cars could catch up. We went down 981 to the roundabout at Arnold Palmer Airport, then on some country roads to Rte. 130 East enjoying the colorful foliage all the way. Flo told us we would pass by Stonehenge Lodge, Oak Lodge and Foggy Mountain Lodge, which I knew nothing about. These lodges are all on Rte. 130 just a few miles apart, not far from the Donegal exit of the PA Turnpike. I have since learned that all of them are rustic mountain getaways with lodging and banquet rooms that place their emphasis on weddings, continued on page 10

business gatherings and club events. Only Oak Lodge has a restaurant open to the public when they do not have an event scheduled, which is normally Tuesday through Thursday 5 to 8 p.m. https://oaklodgepa.com/experiences/the-village/ a few miles from the last lodge we crossed over the PA Turnpike, turned right up the hill on Rte. 31 West past the PA Tpke. exit. A few more turns put us on County Line Rd. for quite a few miles with expansive hilltop views of the colorful Laurel Highlands foliage. We crossed Rte. 711, up the hill towards 7 Springs, then took a sharp right turn onto Indian Creek Road, down a very steep hill to our meal stop at Creekside Grill on the eastern bank of the creek, which at this point runs right beside Rte. 711. This family operated restaurant was new to me, because it just opened last year. Flo had pre-arranged our visit to this small restaurant that had tables lined up for us when we arrived. That was a good thing because by the time we were served the place was at full capacity.

After a great meal with equally great service, we crossed over Rte. 711 again onto more country roads, known only to

Flo, past her parents' church in Buchanan until we came to a stop sign at Acme Pizza & Antique Car Museum at Rte. 31. We were now near the top of Chestnut Ridge looking down into Mt. Pleasant PA. The ride down the steep mountain road was another spectacular panoramic view with foliage in full color that you could see for miles. In the center of Mt Pleasant at the World War I "Doughboy" statue, the most recognizable veteran's statue in Westmoreland County, we turned left and drove just a short distance to our dessert stop at "Suzy's Simply Delicious Ice Cream". I don't think I have ever been to an ice cream place that has as many flavors and combination of toppings and exotic dairy creations as Suzy's. From the patio, sitting in front of the store, there is a spectacular panoramic view of Chestnut Ridge from which we had just descended to get to Suzys. After about 45 minutes of enjoying our dairy delights and catching up on the latest car and other "chit-chat" we found our own way back to our homes, which are scattered around the East of Pittsburgh area. Thanks ever so much to Flo Myers for putting this great WPR-AACA Fall Foliage Tour together. Those who attended had a wonderful time. If anyone else has a tour in their mind, please let us know!
