Wonders in Wood, on Land & Sea

his Spring Jill and I celebrated our 40th Wedding Anniversary. Although our actual anniversary date is June 11, we decided to take a "Spring break" in early May to visit Newport, Rhode Island, a beautiful place that we visited 40 years ago, but have not been back to since.

Our first trip involved a two-day stay in Newport on our way to Cape Cod. Back then, we drove a red, 1976 Oldsmobile 98 sedan once owned by Jill's father. Our 40th Anniversary return trip was in a 1999 Buick Regal, which once belonged to Jill's mother. On both occasions, those family cars did very well on the long trip. However, we're especially proud of the Buick, since it will be an antique next year.

We had fond memories of our first stay in Newport at a quaint bed and breakfast, and visiting two of the legendary "summer home" mansions, Marble House and The Elms, once owned by super wealthy families during the "Gilded Age" of the late 1800s - early 1900s.

On our return visit, we stayed more in the center of downtown Newport at a timeshare unit on a dock overlooking a scenic bay. Many of the downtown attractions were within an easy walk or short drive. We enjoyed several jaunts in the '99 Buick Regal along Newport's "Scenic Ocean Drive". We were also able to tour three historic mansions –Rough Point (once owned by heiress Doris Duke), The Breakers, and a return to Marble House.

Most of the Gilded Age mansions which are preserved for touring are along Bellevue Avenue, a short distance from downtown Newport. As Jill and I were driving along Bellevue Avenue through a nice shopping area, we saw the ornate Audrain Automobile Museum building on the right as we drove by. We were heading back to our unit for dinner then, but Jill saw the excited look in my eyes, so we decided to return the next day for a visit.

The Audrain Automobile Museum is classy and imaginative. It's housed in a restored 1902, Florentine Renaissance inspired building with arched windows and decorative terra cotta motifs on the facade.

Founded in 2014, the museum's mission is "Preserving, Celebrating & Sharing Automotive History." It partners with many other local nonprofit organizations for the betterment of the community. The Audrain Museum also coordinates special events with the legendary Newport mansions.

The main exhibit floor of the museum looks like it can comfortably display around 20 vehicles at a time. The Audrain Automobile Museum has access to collections containing over 400 cars from brass era to the super cars of today. They currently feature four different, creatively-themed exhibitions at the museum each year.

When Jill and I visited the themed exhibition was "Wonders in Wood, on Land & Sea". This featured an extraordinary paring of wood-structured and embellished antique automobiles, accompanied by an intriguing variety of beautiful crafted

Fortunately, the museum was not overly busy when we arrived. After we paid the reasonable admission, we were greeted by a friendly guide, who proceeded to take us on a tour telling us about each of the cars and boats, including a fabulous horse drawn Brewster Park Drag Coach, which was once owned by one of the Vanderbilt families.

The cars on display represented the practical and stylish use of wood in both European and American automobiles during the early-to-mid 20th century. Complimenting the beautiful wooden boats on display were two cars featuring unique, boattailed wooden bodies – a stunning 1914 Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost (one of one), and a light-weight 1925 French Amilcar Petit Sport. The Amilcar's body also had a basket weave applique. Attractive in their own right, and using wood to enhance their usefulness, were a 1922 Model T Ford Depot Hack, 1940 Ford Deluxe Woody Wagon, a special bodied 1928 Morris Oxford Parkes from England and 1951 Fiat 500C Giardiniera (gardener's car) from Italy.

The museum guide also pointed out the cars on display which helped illustrate wooden construction methods used at the time. We got the rare chance to see a 1928 Bugatti Type 44 Roadster, which was undergoing a first class restoration. It was at the point where we could see the wooden framework under its skin. There was also a 1957 Morgan on display with large photos behind it showing English craftsmen building its wooden body frame at the factory.

Another intriguing display was of a "wooden buck" being used by Automotive Restorations in New Jersey to mold and hand form panels for the accurate restoration of a German 1938 Horch 853 Special Roadster. This "wooden buck" was made with the aid of modern 3D scanning and CNC printing.

The beautifully crafted wooden boat displays were interspersed between the cars. Toward the front of the museum was a brightly varnished 1948 Chris-Craft 17 ft Deluxe Runabout with an inboard 6 cylinder, 130 hp engine, a speedy contender in its day. There were also several Herreshoff boats on display, *continued on page 10*

An example of a Herreshoff Amphi-Craft and trailer represented a quality wooden boat built for affordable boating pleasures. A historic 1937 Herreshoff Columbia Dinghy "barn find" once served as the "tender" to transport passengers to the Truant, a yacht owned by Henry Ford.

As the Audrain Museum guide and I talked, he told me that he was fairly new at the museum and felt like "a kid in a candy store". Name That Car

May's Car



Becky Blank was the first to correctly identify May's Car as a 1940 Ford Woody Wagon. Bill Holtzer, Nancy McKelvey and Gary Wiegand also correctly identified the Woody.

This car was a part of the Audrain Automobile Museum's Wonders in Wood, on Land & Sea exhibition in Newport, Rhode Island, which I wrote about in the article featured in this *Western Round-Up* on pages 6-10.

On the wall behind this Woody Wagon you can see a large photo of Ford's 1940 Woody assembly line. The craftsmanship and detail in the roof structure is truly amazing. The 1940 Ford Woody Wagon marked a "cultural shift" from Woodies being utilitarian vehicles to fashion statements.

According to the Audrain Museum, "In 1920, Ford purchased 400,000 acres of forest reserves in northern Michigan to control the entire operation of the wood building aspects of his cars, first for frames, then for wooden bodies." At the time, wood bodied cars were easier and less expensive to build than steel bodied cars. Ford hired experienced cabinet makers and wooden boat builders to work on the wooden structured cars. Over the years, Ford built a strong reputation for high quality Woody Wagons.
