
George Whipkey enjoyed participating in the WPR Car Show at Legion Keener Park, Latrobe.

Thank Mary Elizabeth Anderson When Driving Through Those April Showers

ary Elizabeth Anderson of Birmingham, Alabama (February 19, 1866 – June 27, 1953) was an American real estate developer, rancher, viticulturist, and inventor of the windshield wiper.

On a visit to New York City in the winter of 1902, Anderson sat in a trolley car on a frosty day. She observed that the trolley car driver struggled to see past the windows because of the falling sleet. The trolley car's front window was designed for bad-weather visibility, but its multi-pane windshield system worked very poorly. Therefore, to clear the sights, the driver needed to open the window, lean out of the vehicle, or stop the car to go outside in order to wipe the windshield with his hands. Anderson, who was not an engineer but an entrepreneur, identified the problem and its opportunity. She envisioned a windshield wiper blade that the trolley driver could operate from the inside. At that time, it rarely occurred to anyone else to eliminate the problem. It was something drivers simply accepted and dealt with.

When Mary returned to Alabama she hired a designer for a hand-operated device to keep a windshield clear and had a local company produce a working model. She applied for, and in 1903 was granted, a 17-year patent for a windshield wiper. The patent application was filed on June 18, 1903. On November 10, 1903, the United States Patent Office awarded Anderson patent number 743,801 for her Window Cleaning device.

Her device consisted of a lever inside the vehicle that controlled a rubber blade on the outside of the windshield. The lever could be operated to cause the spring-loaded arm to move back and forth across the windshield. A counterweight was used to ensure contact between the wiper and the window. The device could be easily removed if desired after the winter was over. Similar devices had been made earlier, but Anderson's was the first windshield clearing device to be effective. Anderson's simple mechanism and basic design have remained much the same, but unlike today's windshield wipers, Anderson's could be removed when not needed.

In 1903, when Anderson applied for the patent, cars were not very popular. Henry Ford's Model T automobile had not been manufactured yet. Therefore, when Anderson tried to sell the rights to her invention through a noted Canadian firm of Dinning and Eckenstein in 1905, they rejected her application. They argued, "we do not consider it to be of such commercial value as would warrant our undertaking its sale." Furthermore, many could not see the value of her invention and stressed the risk that the driver would be distracted by operating the device and the moving wipers.



Mary Elizabeth Anderson of Alabama invented and patented the basis of the modern windshield wiper, in 1903, but never profited from it.

By 1913 the automobile manufacturing business had grown exponentially and windshield wipers were standard equipment. In 1922, Cadillac became the first car manufacturer to adopt them as standard equipment. However, Anderson never profited from her invention, the patent expiring in 1920.



This year in Charlotte, they won their eighth Repeat Senior Grand National with the 1970 Monte Carlo. The '70 Monte Carlo also received its' 22nd Preservation Award.

The Harvey's 1974 Monte Carlo won its' First Grand National Award in August of 2001 in Moline, IL. The '74 has also won its' Senior Grand National and three more Repeat Senior Grand National Awards. The '74 also has earned 22 Preservation Awards.

1921 Milburn Electric Model 27L

1921 Milburn Electric Model 27 L


he Milburn Light Electric is an all-electric car, powered by 84 volts and a General Electric DC motor. With a top speed of 25 mph and a range of 70 miles, it has 4 speeds forward, 2 reverse. Over 4,000 Milburn Electrics were manufactured by the Milburn Wagon Company in Toledo from 1914 to 1923. These cars sold for \$2,685 in 1921, while Model T Fords sold for \$595. Milburns were among the most elegant and innovative cars of the time. Lighter than competitors, the body was constructed of an aluminum skin stretched over a wooden frame to reduce weight. It also featured the first rapid-exchange system for installing fresh batteries.

Famous owners included legendary football coach Amos Alonzo Stagg, President Woodrow Wilson, and Secret Service Agents at the White House. Sold around the world, especially in Europe and China, Milburns were shipped in large crates via train and ship, and wheels and batteries were installed upon delivery. Several of the 50+ surviving Milburns remain overseas today.

Electric cars were very common prior to World War I, but Milburn was one of only 3 manufacturers still producing cars after 1920. In 1923, GM purchased the Milburn plant for \$2 million. Buick moved in and the Milburn Electric was no longer produced.

Name That Car

January/February's Car



Howard Finney was the first to correctly identify January/ February's Car as a 1939 Cadillac. Bill and C.J. Maurer, Bill Holtzer and Gary Wiegand, also contacted me with the correct answer.

Cadillac, like other luxury cars, suffered severe sales drops in during the Great Depression of the 1930s. Policy changes and adapting to the times helped save the marque.

Here's an interesting tid bit about a simple, yet amazing innovation that helped improve Cadillac production effeciency and went on to help all auto makers improve themselves. In 1934, Henry F. Phillips introduced the Phillips screw and screwdriver to the market. He entered into talks with General Motors and convinced the Cadillac group his new screws would speed assembly times and therefore increase profits. Cadillac was the first automaker to use the Phillips technology, in 1937, which was widely adopted in 1940.

My Dad always said that Cadillac was the first to introduce many new innovations, the electric starter, etc. Although he never owned or desired to own one, Dad enjoyed seeing what Cadillac would come up with next.
