California Adventures with Cris and Molly - Part 2

hile in California, we visited another car shop/ garage owned by well-known car designer, Chip Foose. The American public was introduced to Foose through a television show called Overhaulin'. The show was a car restoration reality show featuring Foose as one of the hosts. He would design and help with the restoration of old cars which had an interesting back story, and whose owners were secretly nominated by family and friends because they could not afford to restore the cars themselves.

Chip started working for another car designer, influencer, Boyd Coddington who designed and built cars in southern California. Chip was a designer for Boyd and he actually designed Boyd's logo. There was a disagreement between Chip and Boyd, so Chip went on his own to Huntington Beach, CA in 1999. After Boyd's death and his shop closed, Chip brought in

some employees from Boyd's business to make sure they were not out of a job.

We drove to take a tour of Foose's garage. We saw on the website that tours are available Monday through Thursday and they are given promptly at noon. The garage has eight bays and he employs about eight people at this site. We walked up to the garage gate and waited for the garage's secretary to unlock the gate. There were four people at the beginning then two more people arrived for the tour.

We were allowed to walk around the cars in the shop and take pictures. There were drawings (drawn by Chip) on the wall to show the end result of the cars being worked on at the garage. The cars that are in progress were a 1956 Lincoln Continental Mark II (modified), a 50s DeSoto, '56 Chevy Bel Air, and a 30s Ford. There was also a finished Manx Dune Buggy

(a Manx body with a Porsche engine), which is Chip's personal vehicle. The tour guide said the restoration of the '56 Lincoln Continental will cost about a million dollars, and the family has a second Lincoln that is at a different restoration shop being restored to AACA standards, so that when completed both cars will travel to shows and be displayed side by side.

Chip also likes to collect bicycles and those are located throughout the shop.

One of the visitors on the tour wanted to have Chip work on his car so he asked about the cost/expense of restoring a car at Foose's garage. The secretary/tour guide said that most cars start at \$300,000 and can go up to \$5 million with a 2 year waiting list.

The gift shop, next door to the garage, housed Foose's awards and recognitions including the SEMA's Hall of Fame, four Ridler awards (awarded for the Best Roadster) and the Petersen Museum Visionary award. Also at the gift shop was one the 2005 Ridler award winning car, a 1936 Ford Roadster (The Impression). The headlights have V8 etched in the glass.

Currently in the garage, there is a car that was previously-built by Boyd Coddington that Chip is in the process of updating. Foose's garage was used for filming the television, Overhaulin', for the last two years of its production.

HPOF Class is Now AACA Original

ince its founding, AACA has been dedicated to the preservation, restoration, and maintenance of automobiles. In the furtherance of the "preservation" mission, in 1987, the AACA Board of Directors established a program to encourage the saving and display of collector vehicles in their original, as-manufactured condition. This program entitled the "Historical Preservation Original Features (HPOF)" was updated in 2025 to "AACA Original." The AACA Original program encourages owners of vehicles 25 years old or older, to maintain significant original features in this original condition, and to show them at AACA Nationals. A vehicle may be entirely "original" or it may have certain original features such as paint, chassis, upholstery, engine compartment, etc., that are essentially as delivered. These vehicles will not be point judged. It should be noted, that there is no change to the evaluation process or scoring sheets for this class. A vehicle being evaluated for the first time, if certified, will receive an AACA Original board, AACA Original chip, and an AACA Original badge. The badge should be visibly mounted on the vehicle. No vehicle will be re-certified if it does not display the AACA Original badge. The badge will be engraved with the year awarded.

A vehicle having achieved the AACA Original certification award is now eligible for certification at a subsequent Nationals in order to achieve the Senior AACA Original award. If certified as a Senior AACA Original, the owner will receive an AACA Senior tab to be mounted behind the AACA Original badge on the vehicle and a Senior AACA Original preservation chip for mounting on the board. If the vehicle does not certify at the Senior AACA Original level, it will receive a repeat AACA Original chip provided it meets the AACA Original certification standards. If a vehicle is not certified as a Senior AACA Original, it can be reconsidered for the award if the owner submits a request to the VP Judging. The VP will inform the owner whether the request has been granted or denied. If granted, the vehicle can be entered in a subsequent Nationals to be evaluated again for the Senior AACA Original award. The vehicle will either be certified at that time as a Senior AACA Original or if it still does not meet the criteria, it may continue to be eligible for repeat AACA Original awards provided it meets the certification standards. If the re-consideration is denied, the vehicle maintains AACA Original status and is eligible to be shown for AACA Original repeat awards at all future AACA Nationals. No previous National First Prize winners are accepted unless they are original and have been maintained to preserve their originality. An AACA Original certified vehicle that is significantly restored will lose its AACA Original certification.

- a. Vehicles that received their First HPOF certification prior to 2025 will be evaluated for Senior AACA Original Status.
- i. Vehicles certified as an AACA Original but not a Senior will receive the updated AACA Original Badge engraved for the current year and AACA Original Chip. Vehicles will be eligible for Repeat AACA Original Chips at subsequent showings unless successful at petitioning for a reconsideration from the VP of Judging.
- ii. Vehicles certified as a Senior AACA Original will receive the updated AACA Original Badge engraved for the current year, Senior Tab, and Senior AACA Original Chip. Vehicles will be eligible for Repeat Senior AACA Original Chips at subsequent showings.
- b. Members who choose to either a) not recertify their HPOF vehicle into the AACA Original program at a national show, or b) who wish to have their original HPOF certification date on their AACA Original Badge can purchase updated badges.
- i. Purchased AACA Original Badges will be engraved with the year of HPOF Certification at a cost of \$15.00.
- ii. HPOF and Repeat HPOF vehicles may only the purchase the updated AACA Original Badge.
- iii. AACA Original HPOF Vehicles must have both the updated AACA Original Badge and Senior Tab, additional charges may apply.
- iv. For Chip replacement, please contact National Headquarters. The former HPOF and AACA Original HPOF chips are no longer available.

Going to the Drive-In Movies

Once upon a time, Drive-In movie theaters were plentiful in our corner of Pennsylvania. They were fun and economical entertainment. Families would pile into a mammoth station wagon to enjoy the show. Couples would sit together in a cozy sedan or convertible. As the sun went down the screen came alive with the latest cartoons, comedy shorts and features. And don't forget the animated dancing hot dogs and popcorn boxes announcing the intermission.

Guy Davis shared this June 1954 series of Drive-In Theatre ads from the Latrobe Bulletin. The Odin Drive-In was located along Route 30, Greensburg where the Gabriel Brothers plaza is today. In June of '54 they were showing *The Caddy*, which is one of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis's best comedies.

There are a few area Drive-Ins still operating today. But remember to bring a good radio to tune into the sound system.
