A Famous Lincoln Highway Coast-to-Coast Trip Lives Again

Ten Millionth Model T Stops in Greensburg

hen the original Ten Millionth Model T Ford rolled off of the assembly line in 1924, Henry Ford sent it on a promotional driving tour on the Lincoln Highway from New York to San Francisco. That Model T touring car was specially painted with messages touting the production milestone and the 3,389-mile coast-to-coast journey.

Western PA Region members were among those who got a chance to witness the 100th "Platinum Anniversary" re-running of this historic trek on Monday, June 3, 2024, as a 1924 Model T Ford touring car painted with similar Ten Millionth Model T promotional messages made a planned stop along the original Lincoln Highway at Barnhart's Funeral Home on Pittsburgh Street in Greensburg in the late afternoon. A beautiful historic Lincoln Highway marker is located in front of the Funeral Home. The Model T crew parked the historic car in the Funeral Home driveway near this marker and spent some time with welcoming admirers, reporters and photographers.

The re-creation of this historic trek is being conducted by the Museum of American Speed located in Lincoln, Nebraska. June 3 was the second day of the journey. Mark Barnhart of Barnhart Funeral Home worked with WPR members Denny and Becky Blank and WPR Secretary Mark DeFloria to inform WPR members by email and text about the Greensburg stop.

The Ten Millionth Model T and crew planned to arrive at Barnhart's Funeral Home around dinner time on June 3. A 100th Anniversary celebration dinner was also planned for them at Pizza Siena, located across the street. As people gathered at the Barnhart Funeral Home parking lot that day waiting to welcome the car and crew, they were kept informed on the Model T's progress along the Lincoln Highway from Jennerstown to Greensburg. All were very excited to finally see the Model T drive up Pittsburgh Street escorted by a Greensburg Fire Department vehicle with flashing lights and pull into the Funeral Home parking lot.

The previous owner of this 1924 Model T touring car, the late Dr. Alan Hathaway of Davenport Iowa had it painted to replicate the original Ten Millionth Model T. In 1974, Dr. Hathaway drove it from New York to San Francisco on the Lincoln Highway to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the 1924 promotional tour. One stop at the time included the famous Ship Hotel near Bedford, which is now long gone. Then in 1999 Dr. Hathaway made the coast-to-coast drive once again to celebrate the car's 75th Anniversary. This year members of the Hathaway family joined the Museum of American Speed to keep their father's legacy alive by making a repeat 100th Anniversary trip.

Although the Model T got a complete restoration preparing for the trip, it requires regular maintenance every day on the journey. Three expert volunteers from the Museum take turns behind the wheel. After this 100th Anniversary trip, the Ten Millionth Model T will be on permanent display at the Museum of American Speed.

All those who welcomed the Model T and crew in Greensburg were truly amazed at the car's simple tenacity and enjoyed talking with the crew about the car and their adventure. Many thanks to Mark Barnhart, Denny and Becky Blank and Mark DeFloria for helping get the word out about the wonderful opportunity to witness this historic event.

Editor's Note: When the crew went to start the Model T in Greensburg the morning of June 4 to continue their trip, they unfortunately discovered that they had some serious engine problems. They ended up deciding to ship the car back to Lincoln Nebraska for an engine rebuild. After a few days, the Ten Millionth Model T was shipped back to Greensburg to continue heading west on its 100th Anniversary Lincoln Highway "Platinum Tour." That's inspiring dedication and determination!

An Overview of the Model T Ford

"I will build a motor car for the great multitude. It will be large enough for the family, but small enough for the individual to run and care for. It will be constructed of the best materials, by the best men to be hired, after the simplest designs that modern engineering can devise. But it will be so low in price that no man making a good salary will be unable to own one — and enjoy with his family the blessing of hours of pleasure in God's great open spaces." — Henry Ford

The Ford Model T was produced by the Ford Motor Company from October 1, 1908, to May 26, 1927. It is generally regarded as the first mass-affordable automobile, which made car travel available to middle-class Americans. The relatively low price was partly the result of Ford's efficient fabrication, including assembly line production instead of individual handcrafting. The savings from mass production allowed the price to decline from \$780 in 1910 to \$290 in 1924 (\$5,156 in 2023 dollars). It was mainly designed by three engineers, Joseph A. Galamb (the main engineer), Eugene Farkas, and Childe Harold Wills. The Model T was colloquially known as the "Tin Lizzie".

Being the first reliable, easily maintained, mass-market motorized transportation made the Model T into a great success: Within a few days after the release, 15,000 or-

ders were placed. The first production Model T was built on August 12, 1908, and left the factory on September 27, 1908, at the Ford Piquette Avenue Plant in Detroit, Michigan. On May 26, 1927, Henry Ford watched the 15 millionth Model T Ford roll off the assembly line at his factory in Highland Park, Michigan.

The Ford Model T was named the most influential car of the 20th century in the 1999 Car of the Century competition, ahead of the BMC Mini, Citroën DS, and Volkswagen Beetle. Ford's Model T was successful not only because it provided inexpensive transportation on a massive scale, but also because the car signified innovation for the rising middle class and became a powerful symbol of the United States' age of modernization. With over 15 million sold, it was the most sold car in history before being surpassed by the Volkswagen Beetle in 1972.

The Western PA Region has been a part of the heritage displays since 1989 with a promotional booth on the lower lake dam breast and a rotating display of antique and classic cars.

This hobby can bring a much-needed smile to someone's face or bring back a long-forgotten memory. Remember, It's a family affair!



Based on these photos of May's car's hood ornament and hood medallion Bill Holtzer was the first to correctly identify the car as a Kaiser. Denny and Becky Blank also participated and Tom King admitted that he was "stumped" on this one. I have to admit, the buffalo hood ornament is interesting.

Kaiser Motors (formerly Kaiser-Frazer) Corporation made automobiles at Willow Run, Michigan, United States, from 1945 until 1953. In 1953, Kaiser merged with Willys-Overland to form Willys Motors Incorporated, moving its production operations to the Willys plant at Toledo, Ohio, where the company continued to build automobiles under the Kaiser marque including the Kaiser Darrin until 1955. Their South American operations continued to build passenger cars well up into the 1960s. The company changed its name to Kaiser Jeep Corporation in 1963.
